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Dear Residents of Mashpee,

Your Finance Committee is comprised of seven (7) fellow residents, all volunteers, who advise the voters of Mashpee on all matters brought forth at Town Meeting. We are mandated by Town Charter to review all articles posed on the Town warrant, and to provide our recommendations to our fellow voters. We are to investigate, interpret, analyze, and thoroughly explain each Article so that the voter has a clear understanding of the impact of their vote. As part of the above, we are also required to estimate a projected tax rate.

To do so has required meetings with many Town employees and committees, Department Heads, Finance, and Town Management exploring in detail all the nuances of each and every article. We have done that.

This warrant includes 7 Articles for the Special Town Meeting, and 19 Articles for the Annual Town Meeting. Articles 2,3, and 4 address the funding of the Town's operating budget of \$57,029,039; tuition for the students that attend Cape Cod Tech, \$1,088,399 and a Capital Improvement Program budget of \$1,423,700.

The following articles are worthy of mention:

- Special Town Meeting Article 6 Seeks approval to use Community Preservation Act ("CPA") funds for three Affordable Housing projects.
- Special Town Meeting Article 7 Proposes the use of "CPA" funds to design a memorial to recognize Mashpee American Revolutionary War Veterans.
- Annual Town Meeting Article 2 The Omnibus Budget has increased by over 3% from last fiscal year.
- Annual Town Meeting Article 3 A \$1.4 million dollar Capital Improvement Program Budget.
- Annual Town Meeting Article 17 An amendment to the Zoning Bylaws that addresses "Raze and Replace".

The cost of operating a town continues to rise due to numerous factors such as salary and wage contractual obligations, town insurance, employee benefits and debt costs. The increased costs are offset by additional revenues and receipts, available funds ("Free Cash") and increased property valuations so that the tax rate increase is kept to a minimum. Based on the information that is available at this time, the Finance Committee is projecting a tax rate of \$9.04/\$1,000 for Fiscal Year 2019.

We suggest you take the appropriate amount of time to fully analyze where your tax dollars are being spent, by familiarizing yourself with the details around each Article. We additionally recommend that you pay specific attention to those areas most responsible for expenses and communicate with your town leaders to come up with imaginative ways to lessen the tax burden. To do anything less is to accept continuing increases that may potentially lead to overrides. If you have any questions or want additional information please make sure to present your concerns to the Finance Committee, Board of Selectmen, or Town Management.

Remember, this is your town, and you are the legislative body.

This Town Meeting is divided into two separate meetings each having its own set of Warrant Articles. The first part is called the **Special Town Meeting** and addresses Town business within the **current Fiscal Year 2018** which ends on **June 30**, **2018**.

Please note that since funds requested for the articles below have already been collected and are available, approval of the articles in this special meeting will not impact the FY 2019 budget nor will it affect next year's tax rate, which will be set in November 2018 by the Board of Selectmen and the Board of Assessors.

Barnstable, ss:

Greetings to the Constables of the Town,

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and summon the inhabitants of the Town of Mashpee who are qualified to vote in the elections to meet at the Mashpee High School on Monday, the 7th day of May 2018 at 7:00 p.m. for the following purposes:

To act on the articles contained in the following Warrant:

Article 1

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and transfer a sum of money from revenue available for appropriation to the Snow & Ice Account, or take any other action relating thereto.

Submitted by the Department of Public Works

Explanation: This article is necessary to fund a deficit in the Snow & Ice Account.

The Board of Selectmen will make a recommendation at Town Meeting on Article 1

FINCOM: This is the only Town account allowed to deficit spend. \$116,570 was approved for this year. As of March 31, 2018, the DPW spent an additional \$168,391.74 on Snow and Ice removal and treatment of the roads. You are voting to fund the difference from Funds Available for Appropriation.

Approval of Article 1 will have no effect on the final FY 2018 municipal tax rate

The Finance Committee will make a recommendation at Town Meeting on Article 1

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$65,000 to the Kids Klub Enterprise Fund Capital Expense Account for the purpose of capital improvement expenses associated with the enterprise, and to fund said appropriation by transfer from the retained earnings of the enterprise, or take any other action relating thereto.

Submitted by the Recreation Department

Explanation: This article will set aside funding for capital expenditures for the Kids Klub Enterprise.

The Board of Selectmen recommends approval of Article 2 by a vote of 5-0

FINCOM: This article is to release funding that is already available through the Kids Club Enterprise Capital Expense Account. These funds are requesting to be released for much-needed repairs and improvements including issues that have come about come from a drainage problem, replacement of a deck and replacement of the toddler play area.

Approval of Article 2 will have no effect on the final FY 2018 municipal tax rate

The Finance Committee recommends approval of Article 2 by a vote of 6-0

Article 3

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and transfer from available funds \$75,000 to the Human Resources Accrued Benefit Account, or take any other action relating thereto.

Submitted by the Human Resources Department

Explanation: This article is necessary to replenish the Human Resources Accrued Benefits Account.

The Board of Selectmen recommends approval of Article 3 by a vote of 5-0

FINCOM: This article requests the transfer of \$75,000 to the Human Resources Accrual Benefit Account from available funds.

Approval of Article 3 will have no effect on the final FY 2018 municipal tax rate

The Finance Committee recommends approval of Article 3 by a vote of 6-0

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and transfer \$675.35 from revenue available for appropriation to pay previous fiscal year compensation as follows:

John Phelan, Retroactive Payment	\$ 78.77

or take any other action relating thereto.

Explanation: This article is necessary to fund previous fiscal year unpaid compensation in order to meet the Town's contractual obligations.

FINCOM: This article fulfills contractual obligations regarding unpaid compensation.

Approval of Article 4 will have no effect on the final FY 2018 municipal tax rate

Community Preservation Act Funds

FINCOM OVERVIEW:

By way of background, prior to 2004, Cape Cod municipalities had the option of participating in a program called the **Cape Cod Open Space Land Acquisition Program** (a.k.a. **Cape Cod Land Bank**) in order to raise funds locally to purchase lands to be held as open space. Mashpee's participation in the "Land Bank" began in 1999. Beginning with the FY 2005 budget, the Commonwealth offered an optional program called the **Community Preservation Act (CPA)** which allowed a municipality to collect funds through an annual 3% surcharge on property assessments, which then was to be matched by state funds, thereby increasing the amount of available money The program, however, does impose specific, limited categories for which funds can be used. These uses include the acquisition, creation, preservation, rehabilitation and/or restoration of: 1) **Open Space** 2) **Historic**, 3) **Recreation**, and 4) **Affordable Housing** purposes.

As required by the legislation, Mashpee's participation in the CPA program was approved and adopted by the Town's voters at the October 2004 Town Meeting and at the General Election held in November 2004. The creation of the **Community Preservation Committee (CPC)** was approved by the voters at the May 2005 Town Meeting.

To see if the Town will appropriate and transfer pursuant to the provisions of M.G.L. C. 44B, §6 to reserve from the Community Preservation Fund Budgeted for Appropriation Reserve, the following amounts:

\$5,504	10% for Historic Purposes
\$5,504	10% for Community Housing Purposes

Explanation: This is a "clean-up" article to meet the requirement of reserving funds from the supplemental CPA FY 2018 Trust Fund distribution. The amount of FY 2018 CPA state reimbursement received by the Town of Mashpee was \$55,038 higher than the initial estimate. We are required to set aside 10% of those excess funds and deposit them into each of the CPA reserves. Funding shall derive from the Community Preservation Budgeted for Appropriation Reserve.

The Board of Selectmen recommends approval of Article 5 by a vote of 5-0

FINCOM: The FY 2018 CPA state reimbursement received by the Town of Mashpee was \$55,038 higher than the initial estimate. We are required to set aside 10% of those excess funds and deposit them into each of the CPA reserves.

Approval of Article 5 will have no effect on the final FY 2018 municipal tax rate

The Finance Committee recommends approval of Article 5 by a vote of 6-0

Article 6

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and transfer the sum of \$167,000 from the Community Preservation Fund 10% Affordable/Community Housing Reserve pursuant to the provisions of M.G.L., C. 44B, §5 for the purpose of funding the Habitat for Humanity Scattered Site Mashpee Community Housing project including necessary costs and expenses related thereto, as recommended by the Community Preservation Committee, or take any other action relating thereto.

Explanation: A total of 3 parcels are proposed in this affordable housing project which consists of (3) three-bedroom ranch style homes. The homes would be built at the site; 56 DeGrasse Road (Parcel ID 104-48-0), and at a one-acre site located at 341 Great Neck Road North (Parcel ID 60-13-0), 2 homes. The cost contribution for this project is \$50,000 per home, plus the purchase of the Great Neck Road North property for \$17,000. The DeGrasse site is part of a subdivision plan with conditions imposed by the Planning Board for affordable housing. The Great Neck Road North property is a non-conforming site, deemed unbuildable. Since the Great Neck Road North site does not conform to current zoning requirements, a G.L. c. 40B Comprehensive Permit will be required from the Zoning Board of Appeals. The homes will be deeded in perpetuity as affordable, and offered to low income households earning at or less than 65% of the area median income.

The vote of the Community Preservation Committee was 7-2 in support of this article.

The Board of Selectmen recommends approval of Article 6 by a vote of 5-0

FINCOM: This article approves 3 parcels of land to be designated in perpetuity for affordable housing. The CPA is funding \$167,000 for the Habitat for Humanity project.

The Town of Mashpee continues to struggle with affordable housing having only approximately 4.5% of Town housing in the affordable category. The State has recommended that Mashpee achieve 10%. This article provides funding from the Community Preservation Fund 10% Affordable/Community Housing Reserve (money already set aside for Affordable Housing) to assist in enabling Habitat for Humanity in building 3 Affordable Housing homes, as well as purchasing property on one parcel for this purpose. This will enable three additional Mashpee families earning less than 65% of the area medium income to become independent home owners.

Approval of Article 6 will have no effect on the final FY 2018 municipal tax rate

The Finance Committee recommends approval of Article 6 by a vote of 4-0-1

Article 7

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and transfer the sum of \$32,500 from the Community Preservation Fund 10% Historic Reserve pursuant to the provisions of M.G.L., C. 44B, §5 for the purpose of funding the Mashpee American Revolutionary War Memorial project and the development of a conceptual design including necessary costs and expenses related thereto, as recommended by the Community Preservation Committee, or take any other action relating thereto.

Submitted by the Community Preservation Committee

Explanation: The goal of this project is to honor Mashpee American Revolutionary War Veterans. Research conducted by the Mashpee Historical Commission and Historic District Commission has identified the names of forty-five (45) Wampanoag Tribe members, comprised of 9 different regiments from the Town of Mashpee, who participated in the American Revolutionary War. Grant funding in the amount of \$15,000 is being requested. In the grant process, matching funds are required. CPA funding in the amount of \$15,000 would fulfill the grant requirement to move this project forward. The sum of \$17,500 was also approved by the CPC to fund the development of a conceptual design for the Memorial. The vote of the Community Preservation Committee was 9-0 in support of this article.

The Board of Selectmen recommends approval of Article 7 by a vote of 5-0

FINCOM: This article funds provides funds for the Mashpee American Revolutionary War Memorial project. Of which, the Town has received matching grant funds. The project includes the development of a conceptual design for the memorial.

Approval of Article 7 will have no effect on the final FY 2018 municipal tax rate

The Finance Committee recommends approval of Article 7 by a vote of 6-0

Explanation: The 2017 Annual Town Report in which the reports of Town officers are presented is available at the Town Meeting and at the Town Hall.

FINCOM: This article seeks Town Meeting acceptance of the Town Officers Annual Report from all Departments, Boards and Committees.

The Finance Committee recommends approval of Article 1 by a vote of 6-0

ARTICLE 2 FINCOM OVERVIEW: Article 2 below seeks Town Meeting approval for the Town Manager's budget to fund the Town of Mashpee's municipal operations for Fiscal Year 2019 (July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2019). The right hand column is the Town Manager's recommended funding by each Department's salary and expense line (see lines 1 thru 71) the annual amount of debt (see lines 72 thru 77) and the funding levels for certain expense lines (see lines 78 thru 83).

To the left of the Town Manager's funding request is the Finance Committee's recommended funding level. To the left of the Finance Committee's recommendation is the Department Head's initial funding level request, and to the left of that is the prior year's funding level.

As you will note at the end of the budget presentation, the Town Manager's Grand Total recommended budget request for **FY 2019 is \$57,029, 039,** an increase of **\$2,158,864**, or **3.93%**, over the **FY 2018** approved budget of **\$54,870,175**.

Part of the role of the Finance Committee as advisors to you, the Legislative branch of our Town government, is to review each line item of the budget and vote whether to approve or disapprove, and recommend a different funding level for any line item or total budget request.

The Finance Committee voted 4-0-1 to approve each line item of the Town Manager's proposed Omnibus Budget (including the **School Budget of \$21,381,532**).

Line Items 72 thru 77 of the FY 2019 Budget are the Principal and Interest on the Town's debt – the equivalent of the mortgage on your home – the table below projects the Town's current, very favorable debt payment schedule through FY 2035.

With regard to the budget itself, the Finance Committee has noted in the past those line items that will be increasing or decreasing by more than **\$50,000** from the prior year's funding level. The reason that \$50,000 was chosen is because that is roughly what causes the tax rate to increase by one cent. In other words, if the funding level of a line item increases or decreases by \$50,000 from the prior year, the tax rate will be affected by <u>approximately</u> **\$0.01**. In the budget presented here, the recommended funding level of the following line items will change by \$50,000 or more:

- Natural Resources Increase \$105,305: Salaries and Wages \$79,605, Shellfish Propagation \$30,000, Expenses are down \$4,300
- School Increase \$511,149 (Both Salaries & Wages and Expenses)
- DPW Increase \$180,628: Salaries and Wages \$79,282; Expense \$106,427; Buildings and Grounds down \$5,081

And finally, one of the Finance Committee mandates by Mashpee's Charter is a requirement that the Fin-Com project a tax rate based on the budget presented. The word "project" being the operative word, because the Fin-Com is trying to tell you in May what the resultant tax rate could be when it is established in November without knowing 1) how much the state will provide Mashpee in "Aid to Municipalities" funding; 2) the final municipal non-property tax revenues for this year or the unspent prior year appropriation amounts; and 3) most importantly, what the final Total of Property Assessments for the Town will be for the year. Over the past years of making these projections despite the variables noted, except for one year, the Fin-Com projection has been reasonably close to the final tax rate.

The projected tax rate for FY 2019, using the appropriations included in this budget **(\$57,029,039)**, adding the Capital Improvement budget of **\$1,423,700 (Article 3)**, the Cape Cod Regional Technical High School (**\$1,088,399**) and the **\$380,000** Budget Overlay which, in effect, is a reserve for uncollected taxes, the total municipal budget request for FY 2019 will be **\$59,921,138**. On the assumption that property values are increasing, and there will be more new construction activity, the total of property assessments is expected to increase by **3%**. The projected tax rate will be **\$9.04/\$1,000 of assessed value – an increase of \$.12 from FY 2018 tax rate**.

By definition, a "capital" item, is equipment having at least a five (5) year life and a cost of at least twenty-five thousand (\$25,000) dollars.

The Finance Committee recommends approval of Article 3 by a vote of 4-0-1

Article 4

To see if the Town will vote to approve the annual regional school district budget for the Cape Cod Regional Technical High School District for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2018, in the amount of \$14,944,000, and further, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,088,399 to meet its share of the cost of operation and maintenance of the Cape Cod Regional Technical High School District for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2018, or take any other action relating thereto.

Explanation: Mashpee's share of the Cape Cod Regional Technical High School budget is \$1,088,399. There are 53 students from Mashpee at the Cape Cod Regional Technical High School, a decrease of 4 students from last year.

FINCOM: This article appropriates \$1,088,399 for Mashpee's share of the Cape Cod Regional Technical High School District for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2018. Explanation: The Department of Revenue now requires the Town to vote a yearly budget based on estimated expenditures from the fund for the next fiscal year. The total budget voted may not exceed the current balance within the fund.

FINCOM: The Department of Revenue by legislative act requires all towns to bring to the voters an annual budget for approval based on expected expenditures for the Public, Education & Governmental (PEG) Access and Cable Related fund for the upcoming fiscal year. The total budget presented to voters may not exceed the current balance in the fund.

The Finance Committee recommends approval of Article 8 by a vote of 6-0

Article 9

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, borrow or transfer from available funds \$600,830 to provide for road improvement projects under the Chapter 90 program, or take any other action relating thereto.

Submitted by the Department of Public Works

Explanation: This article authorizes use of funds which will be 100% reimbursed by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The budget approved each fiscal year by the Legislature and Governor establishes the total funding available for Chapter 90 local transportation aid for that year. These funds are then apportioned to the 351 Massachusetts towns and cities.

The funding authorized by this article is the maximum anticipated Town's share of the FY19 Chapter 90 program.

The Board of Selectmen recommends approval of Article 9 by a vote of 5-0

FINCOM: Every year the Town receives state funding for road improvements. This article allows the Town to improve roads prior to the receipt of those funds.

The Finance Committee recommends approval of Article 9 by a vote of 6-0

Article 10

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and transfer the sum of \$39,000 from revenue available for appropriation to the Department of Natural Resources to fund the third and final year of a monitoring contract with the University of Massachusetts Dartmouth for monitoring water quality associated with Shellfish Aquaculture in Popponesset Bay and Waquoit Bay and its effectiveness in reducing water-column nutrient concentrations, or take any other action relating thereto.

Submitted by the Board of Selectmen

Explanation: The Town's wastewater program relies heavily on aquaculture to reduce nitrogen in the bays. While the Town has an excellent understanding of the nitrogen reduction reductions from each clam or oyster, it is less clear what nitrogen reductions occur in the sediments beneath healthy shellfish populations. This study will quantify the additional nitrogen reductions that are a distinct benefit from the aquaculture program. The results of this study will enable the Town to understand the additional incremental reductions in nitrogen that it can take credit for with state and federal regulatory agencies, and therefore, offset and avoid additional and more expensive means of nitrogen management. This is the third year of a three year analysis.

The Board of Selectmen recommends approval of Article 10 by a vote of 5-0

FINCOM: This request continues the practice from the last two years to transfer \$39,000 from revenue available to fund the final year of a three-year study to understand the additional incremental nitrogen reductions in the bays.

The Finance Committee recommends approval of Article 10 by a vote of 6-0

Article 11

To see if the town will vote to appropriate and transfer the sum of \$19,000 from the Waterways Improvement Fund to the Great River/Little River Extension Account for the purpose of conducting an engineering survey of the channels area from the center of Waquoit Bay to the existing Little River Channel then continuing from the existing Little River Channel to the entrance of Hamblin Pond and extending from the end of the existing Little River Channel to the end of Great River and entrance to Jehu Pond, or take any other action relating thereto.

Submitted by the Waterways Commission

Explanation: This Article will transfer funds from the Waterways Improvement Fund to cover engineering survey costs to establish the location of the entire channel complex to be covered in a future dredging permit application.

The Board of Selectmen recommends approval of Article 11 by a vote of 5-0

FINCOM: This article looks to designate \$19,000 of engineering costs to determine the channel areas from the main channel in Waquoit Bay to the Little River channel. The funds are coming from the Waterways Improvement Fund which is funded by mooring and boat excise tax fees.

The Finance Committee recommends approval of Article 11 by a vote of 6-0

Article 12

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and transfer the sum of \$25,000 from the Waterways Improvement Fund to the Department of Natural Resources Equipment Expense Account for the purpose of purchasing equipment/hardware for maintenance of the waterways by the Department of Natural Resources/Harbormaster, or take any other action relating thereto.

Submitted by the Waterways Commission

Explanation: This Article will transfer funds from the Waterways Improvement Fund to cover the costs of channel markers, associated hardware, chains, anchors and miscellaneous equipment which is needed by the Harbormaster to properly identify the channels for safe navigation.

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and transfer from the FY 2019 Community Preservation Fund Estimated Revenues the sum of \$40,000 to the Community Preservation Committee Administrative and Operating Expense Account, pursuant to the provisions of M.G.L., C. 44B, §5, including any necessary costs related thereto, as recommended by the Community Preservation Committee or take any other action relating thereto.

Submitted by the Community Preservation Committee

Explanation: To provide annual funding in FY 2019 for the administrative and operational costs of the Community Preservation Committee which includes project costs associated with and incidental to the Community Preservation Committee. Under the CPA Act, up to 5% of the annual CPA funds may be spent on the operation and administrative costs of the Community Preservation Committee. Funding supports legal and professional fees, technical reviews, appraisal costs, signage, annual Community Preservation Coalition dues, administrative wages, office supplies and similar costs associated with and incidental to the development of a CPA project.

The vote of the Community Preservation Committee was 9-0 in support of this article.

The Board of Selectmen recommends approval of Article 14 by a vote of 5-0

FINCOM: The Community Preservation Committee (CPC) has annual administrative and operating expenses that are funded through the CPA estimated revenues. This article establishes a budget and appropriates the funding for those expenses.

The Finance Committee recommends approval of Article 14 by a vote of 6-0

Article 15

To see if the Town will vote to continue participation in the Community Septic Management Program and the Massachusetts Clean Water Trust for the purpose of making loans to residents of the Town for repairing and/or upgrading residential septic systems pursuant to agreements between the Board of Health and residential property owners, including all costs incidental and related thereto, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Submitted by the Board of Health

Explanation: The Commonwealth of Massachusetts, through the Clean Water Trust (formerly Water Pollution Abatement Trust), has provided approximately \$660,000.00 at 0% interest to the Town of Mashpee to assist homeowners in complying with failed Title V systems since 1998. The loans are available to homeowners at 5% interest, to cover any ongoing costs of the program. Loans must be secured by a betterment assessed by the Town on the property being improved by the loan. In 2006, Barnstable County created their own community loan program. The repayment of the loans to the Town with the 5% interest is being repaid through previously issued property betterments. In order for the Town to be able to re-loan funds to future additional septic projects, the Town must annually reauthorize/re-approve participation in the Community Septic Management Program. Failure to reauthorize participation in the Program will restrict the Town from re-loaning funds to homeowners with failed septic systems. The repaid monies will be held in an account with the principal amount repaid to the Massachusetts Clean Water Trust as scheduled.

The Board of Selectmen recommends approval of Article 15 by a vote of 5-0

FINCOM: The Town has been able to provide low interest loans to homeowners for the maintenance and upgrading of septic systems through funds provided to the Town from the Clean Water Trust since 1998. The Town of Mashpee contains thousands of septic systems that have a limited life expectancy and are expensive when repairs or upgrades are necessary. This program benefits the majority of residents who need this work done.

The Finance Committee recommends approval of Article 15 by a vote of 6-0

Article 16

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen and/or the Conservation Commission to acquire title to a portion of that certain parcel of land designated on Mashpee Assessors' Map 45 as Block 50-0, located at 103 Meetinghouse Rd. in Mashpee, Barnstable County, Massachusetts, consisting of Three and Seventy Two One Hundredths (3.72 ac.) acres, more or less, as more specifically shown on the Plan of Land dated April 13, 2017, prepared for Mark and Donna Lopez by Cape & Islands Engineering (the "Plan"), by purchase from or exchange with owners thereof for open space, conservation and passive recreation purposes, consistent with the provisions of M.G.L. Ch.40, §8C and Article 97 of the Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts; and, in consideration of said acquisition, to authorize the Selectmen and/or Conservation Commission to transfer and convey by sale or exchange a portion of that certain parcel of Town owned land designated on the Mashpee Assessors' Map 45 as Block 9-0, located at 127 Meetinghouse Rd. in Mashpee, Barnstable County, Massachusetts, consisting of Three and Seventy Two One Hundredths (3.72 ac.) acres, more or less, as shown on said Plan; further, to authorize the Board of Selectmen and Conservation Commission to petition the General Court for such authorization and approval as may be required under Article 97 of the Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to effect the exchange of land proposed herein; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen and Conservation Commission to enter into all agreements and execute any and all instruments on behalf of the Town, upon such terms and conditions as they shall deem to be in the best interest of the Town, to effect said exchange of real property interests; or take any other action relating thereto.

Explanation: The purpose of this article is to authorize the execution of an even swap of land acreage between privately owned land and Town owned conservation land (3.72 acre areas, respectively). A portion of Mashpee conservation land known as Lopez Conservation land, located at 103 Meetinghouse Rd, contains a driveway/ easement that provides access between Meetinghouse Rd and the Lopez family residence at 127 Meetinghouse Rd. The Lopez family desires to swap an even acreage of undeveloped land on their lot (a 3.72 acre portion of their existing private land) that directly abuts Mashpee conservation land and abuts a portion of the Mashpee River. By executing this even acreage land swap, the Lopez family would no longer need an easement through conservation land to use their existing driveway by virtue of acquiring the land around it. In exchange, the Mashpee Conservation Department would receive an equal acreage piece of undeveloped private land that directly abuts existing conservation land and provides a direct connection to the Mashpee River. Acquiring this piece of land provides permanent protection for a portion of riverfront habitat, which is considered to have substantial wildlife habitat value. Additionally, this portion of land currently owned by the Lopez family provides a connective wildlife habitat corridor between two abutting parcels to the north and south, both of which are preserved as conservation land (Massachusetts Division of Fish and Wildlife and Trustees of Reservation lands respectively). The current conservation land to be swapped is comprised of upland habitat with an existing dirt driveway running through it.

The Board of Selectmen recommends approval of Article 16 by a vote of 5-0

FINCOM: This article will authorize the swap of 3.72 undeveloped acres of privately owned (Lopez Family) land located at 127 Meetinghouse Road with an equivalent parcel of Town undeveloped 3.72 acres known as the Lopez Conservation land located at 103 Meetinghouse Road. The swap will eliminate the need for the current driveway easement and provides the Town with land that directly abuts existing conservation land.

The Finance Committee recommends approval of Article 16 by a vote of 4-0-1

Article 17

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Bylaws by adding a new section § 174-17.1 to read as follows:

§174-17.1 Raze and Replace:

No pre-existing, non-conforming single or two family dwelling structure shall be razed and replaced on any lot unless a Special Permit issued by the Zoning Board of Appeals authorizes such action. For purposes of this section, "razed and replaced" shall be defined as the voluntary removal of one hundred percent (100%) of all pre-existing structural materials and mechanical systems of a structure or structures, exclusive of foundations, and the replacement of those materials and systems with new materials and systems in furtherance of the creation of housing. Such a Special Permit may be granted only if the Zoning Board of Appeals finds that any changes, extensions or alterations of the pre-existing non-conformities are not substantially more detrimental to the neighborhood than those non-conformities existing prior to the razing of the existing structure and that there is adequate land area on the lot to provide sufficient parking. In no case shall any new non-conformities be created with respect to any replacement structure without the issuance of a Variance or take any other action relating thereto.

Explanation: This article will clarify the authority of the Zoning Board of Appeals and the procedure to review and regulate the razing and replacement of pre-existing non-conforming dwelling structures under the Zoning Bylaws.

The Board of Selectmen recommends approval of Article 17 by a vote of 5-0

FINCOM: This article clarifies the Zoning Board of Appeals ability to approve the razing and replacing of pre-existing non-conforming dwellings.

The Finance Committee recommends approval of Article 17 by a vote of 4-0-1

Article 18

To see if the Town will vote pursuant to M.G.L. ch. 40 to authorize the Board of Selectmen to purchase an 80 percent low income restriction on a real property identified as 37 Center Street, (Mashpee Assessors Map 36, Parcel 47D) using general funds, Community Preservation Act, donations, and/or other sources of revenue, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to prepare and execute such agreements, deeds, and other instruments necessary to effect such transfer upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen shall deem to be in the interest of the Town, or take any other action relating thereto.

Explanation: The 37 Center Street condominium was built pursuant to a comprehensive permit issued under M.G.L. C. 40B. When it was sold to Ms. McBrien, a deed restriction was placed on the property limiting the resale to persons who make no more than 120 percent of the median area income. While the property was constructed under a comprehensive permit, the property does not contribute to the Town's affordable/subsidized housing inventory. The purchase of the restriction to persons who make 80 percent of the median area income would increase the Town's affordable/subsidized housing the property to it.

The Board of Selectmen does <u>not</u> recommend approval of Article 18 by a vote of 4-0-1

FINCOM: This petition article requests the Town of Mashpee Board of Selectmen to purchase the 80% low income restriction on property located at 37 Center Street, using general funds, Community Preservation Act funds, and or other sources of revenue. The purchase would in effect enable the property to be added to the Affordable Housing inventory of the Town which at present is woefully under state suggested percentages, and remove it from the 80% low income restriction category which per historic figures is not a successful program.

The Finance Committee does *not* recommend approval of Article 18 by a vote of 5-0-1

Article 19

To see if the Town will vote pursuant to M.G.L. ch. 40 to authorize the Board of Selectmen to release and extinguish a 120 percent moderate income restriction on a real property identified as 37 Center Street, (Mashpee Assessors Map 36, Parcel 47D) and recorded in the Land Court Department of the Barnstable Registry of Deeds as part of Document No. 1,021,017 in consideration of the payment of all funds in excess of that allowed under the resale provisions of the deed restriction to the Mashpee Affordable Housing Trust for purposes of developing affordable housing, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to prepare and execute such agreements, deed, and other instruments necessary to effect such transfer upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen shall deem to be in the interest of the Town.

Explanation: The 37 Center Street condominium was built pursuant to a comprehensive permit issue under M.G.L. C. 40B. When it was sold to Ms. McBrien, a deed restriction was placed on the property limiting the resale price. It also requires that it be marketed first through the Housing Assistance Corporation (HAC) to persons who make no more than 120 percent of the median area income and if unable to be sold through HAC, could be sold to a "non-eligible" purchaser, but would remain subject to the restriction. HAC did not attempt to market the property as it has no "eligible" purchasers and no "non-eligible" price. While the property was constructed under a comprehensive permit, the property does not contribute to the Town's affordable/subsidized housing inventory because only properties restricted to 80 percent of the median area income qualify for the inventory. The article provides authority for the Board of Selectmen to release the restriction in exchange for Ms. McBrien providing a payment of all funds in excess of the resale price for the Affordable Housing Trust. A release of the restriction under the proposed article will provide needed funds to support affordable housing and not impact the Town's attempts to attain the ten percent affordable housing goal of M.G.L. C. 40B.

The Board of Selectmen recommends approval of Article 19 by a vote of 4-0-1

FINCOM: This petition article seeks to have the moderate housing restriction lifted at 37 Center Street, Mashpee.

The Finance Committee recommends approval of Article 19 by a vote of 4-0-1

TOWN MEETING RULES AND DEFINITIONS

- 1. The conduct of Mashpee's Town Meeting is governed by State Law, the Town's Charter, Bylaws and the publication **Town Meeting Time**.
- 2. Quorum. One hundred (100) registered voters shall constitute a quorum of a Special Town Meeting. Quorum for an Annual Meeting shall be zero (0).
- 3. The Moderator presides over the Town Meeting, decides all questions of order and procedure, and announces the results of all votes. The results of all votes are announced by the Moderator, shall be final except on a voice vote which may be questioned by any voter standing in his/her place and questions any oral "yea" or "nay" vote. In such case, a hand-counted vote shall be taken without debate.
- 4. The main body of the house shall be reserved for registered voters; non-voters will be seated in a special section.
- 5. Articles in the Warrant give notice of the issues subject to discussion at a Town Meeting and establish the parameters of matters that can be debated and acted on. Amendments, motions and/or debate determined by the Moderator, with the advice of Town Counsel, to be "beyond the scope" of the Articles may not be permitted.
- 6. In order for the Town Meeting to act on or discuss an Article, a motion must be made. The Moderator will call for a motion on each Article and, if no motion is made after the second call, the Moderator will "pass over" the Article and move on to the next Article. In order to bring back a "passed over" Article for a motion and discussion, there must be an approved "motion for reconsideration".
- 7. Articles may be postponed by a majority vote or advanced by a 2/3 vote.
- 8. To address the Town Meeting, a speaker must be recognized by the Moderator and once recognized, a speaker should first give his or her name and address for the record. No speaker will be recognized while another person is speaking except to raise "a point of order", which is used to question a ruling of the Moderator or the conduct of Town Meeting. Points of Order are not to address the subject matter being discussed.
- 9. All matters shall be decided by a majority vote unless a 2/3 or greater vote is required. If more than a majority vote is required, the Moderator shall announce the required percentage for passage before calling the vote.

- 10. The Moderator may set time limits on all presentations and may terminate debate on a motion when he deems it appropriate. Debate on a motion may also be terminated by a voter "moving the question" which, if accepted by the Moderator as not being premature, shall be voted on without discussion or debate. A motion to "move the question" requires a 2/3 vote for passage.
- 11. Only two (2) amendments to a motion may be on the floor at any particular time. Amendments over six (6) words must be submitted to the Moderator in writing and, of over fifty (50) words, sufficient copies must be available to those attending at the entrance of the hall before the start of that particular session.
- 12. Generally, amendments shall be voted on in the order made and prior to the vote on the motion to be amended. However, amendments relating to amounts to be appropriated shall be voted on in a descending order until an amount gains approval.
- 13. Reconsideration of Votes. No vote shall be reconsidered at the same meeting at which it is acted upon unless public notice of the intention to move such reconsideration is given within thirty (30) minutes of the declaration of the vote by the Moderator, and no notice of intent to move reconsideration on any vote shall be received by the Moderator more than two (2) times at the same meeting. The Town Clerk shall note, in writing, the action taken and time of such vote and also the time when the notice of reconsideration is given.
- 14. Majority Voting Requirement. No article within any Annual or Special Town Meeting Warrant shall be moved for consideration after 10:00 p.m. without a two-thirds vote of the Town Meeting.
